SAINTE ANNE WIFE, MOTHER, GRANDMOTHER

Although the books of Sacred Scripture never mention the mother of the Blessed Virgin Mary, traditions about her family, childhood, education, and eventual betrothal to Joseph developed very early in the history of the church. The oldest and most influential source for these is the apocryphal Gospel of James, which was written around the middle of the second century AD.

The story tells us: In Nazareth there lived a rich and pious couple, Joachim and Anne. They were childless. When on a feast day Joachim presented himself to offer sacrifice in the temple, he was repulsed by a certain Ruben, under the pretext that men without offspring were unworthy to be admitted. Whereupon Joachim, bowed down with grief, did not return home, but went into the mountains to make his plaint to God in solitude. Also Anne, having learned the reason of the prolonged absence of her husband, cried to the Lord to take away from her the curse of sterility, promising to dedicate her child to the service of God. Their prayers were heard; an angel came to Anne and said: "Anne, the Lord has looked upon your tears; You will conceive and give birth and the fruit of your womb will be blessed by all the world". The angel made the same promise to Joachim, who returned to his wife. Anne gave birth to a daughter whom she called Mary.

The subject of Joachim and Anne *The Meeting at the Golden Gate* was a regular component of art depicting of the Life of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Upon hearing the words of the angel and offering sacrifice, Joachim returns to Jerusalem where he meets his wife at the Golden Gate. Here they embrace. They are aware of Anne's pregnancy, of which they have been separately informed by an archangel. This moment stood for the conception of Mary, and the feast was celebrated on the same day as the Immaculate Conception.

Sainte Anne has been honored as a saint from the days of early Christianity where her life and her connection as holy mother of Mary and grandmother of Jesus was very popular among the early Christians. In the year 550, a church was built in honor of Sainte Anne in Jerusalem. It is believed to be near where Anne, Joachim and Mary lived.

Since the Seventh Century, the Greek and Russian Churches have celebrated feasts honoring Saint Joachim and Sainte Anne. This devotion spread to the west in the Sixteen Century where it has been prominent ever since in many countries.

Sainte Anne is patroness of unmarried women, housewives, women in labor or who want to be pregnant, grandmothers, educators and teachers. She is also a patroness of horseback riders, cabinet-makers and miners. As the mother of Mary, this devotion to Saint Anne as the patron of miners arises from the medieval comparison between Mary and Christ and the precious metals silver and gold. Anne's womb was considered the source from which these precious metals were mined. Saint Anne is also said to be a patron saint of sailors and a protector from storms.

Sainte Anne is the patron saint of many cities throughout the world including:

Detroit (Michigan), Brittany (France), Chinandega (Nicaragua), the Mi'kmaq people of Canada, Castelbuono (Sicily), Quebec (Canada), Santa Ana (California), Norwich (Connecticut), Adjuntas (Puerto Rico), Santa Ana and Jucuarán (El Salvador), Berlin (New Hampshire), Santa Ana Pueblo, Seama, and Taos (New Mexico), Chiclana de la Frontera, Marsaskala, Tudela and Fasnia (Spain), Town of Sta Ana Province of Pampanga, Hagonoy, Santa Ana, Taguig City, Saint Anne Shrine, Malicboy, Pagbilao and Santana (Brazil), Saint Anne (Illinois), Sainte Anne Island, Baie Sainte Anne and Praslin Island (Seychelles), Bukit Mertajam and Port Klang (Malaysia), Klúcové (Slovakia) and South Vietnam. The parish church of Vatican City is Sant'Anna dei Palafrenieri. There is a shrine dedicated to Saint Anne in the Woods in Bristol, United Kingdom

OUR STORY



On July 24, 1701, twenty-five canoes glided to a stop at the foot of a high bluff which ran along a narrow part of the Detroit River near where Hart Plaza is today. French explorer Antoine de la Mothe Cadillac and his party began construction of a new settlement, Fort Ponchartrain du Detroit. Dedicating the new settle-

ment to Ste. Anne, Mother of Mary and Grandmother of Jesus, on her feast day, July 26, 1701, Ste. Anne Church was the first structure to be completed. The structure was 24.5 feet wide, 35 feet long, and 10 feet tall at the eaves. It had a door with a lock, and glass-less windows with wooden shutters.

The present structure, built in 1886, is the seventh or eighth structure. Designed by Leon Coquard, the church is an example of Gothic Revival style. Features of the church include: twin spires, a 35-foot altar, pinnacles, flying buttresses and turrets. It contains many artifacts from the church building that proceeded the present structure including the 1818 cornerstone, the altar in the chapel, the communion rail, the Beaubien Bell, and the statue of Ste. Anne and Mary. Also, some windows were removed from the earlier church and are the oldest stained-glass found in Detroit. Of special interest are crutches and braces left at Ste. Anne's side altar by people who



credited her intercession for their cures.

Father Gabriel Richard was not the first pastor of Ste. Anne parish, but he was one of the most well-known. Born and ordained in France, Fr. Richard narrowly escaped the French Revolution with his life. Leaving the religious persecution of France, Fr. Richard eventually arrived in Detroit. Once in the city, Fr. Richard founded schools for boys, girls, the deaf, and for Native Americans. He was one of

the three founders of the University of Michigan. He worked tirelessly to overcome ignorance, poverty, and bigotry. The motto for Detroit, "Speramus meliora; resurget cineribus," "We hope for better things; it will rise from the ashes" was written by Father Richard after the Great Fire of 1805. Fr. Richard's final resting place is at Ste. Anne. His tomb can be visited in the chapel.



The parish has gone through many changes in its 300-plus years of history. Saved from the wrecking ball in the late 1960s, the church stands today as part shrine, part historical treasure, and part geographical parish in a revitalized, multi-ethnic, bilingual neighborhood..

In 2011, Pope Benedict XVI named Ste. Anne the Patroness of the Archdiocese of Detroit. This was followed in 2017 with the declaration by the Archdiocese of Ste. Anne Parish named the official Shrine to Ste. Anne, her patroness. This year, Pope Francis designated our historic church a minor Basilica – The Basilica of Ste. Anne de Detroit.





The ombrellino (umbrella), originally used as a canopy carried over the Pope, is now given as an honor to those churches with the title "Basilica". It has broad alternating gold and red stripes, the traditional colors of the Pontificate.

The keys behind the shield are the papal keys and represent the keys given to Peter by Jesus Christ. The Gold key signifying that the power reaches to heaven and the Silver key that it extends to all the faithful on earth. The Keys are bound together with a red cord., which represents the link between the power of heaven and earth.

The shield is outlined in green for Ste. Anne and features her teaching her daughter Mary the Word of God. Two Silver lilies appear on either side of Ste. Anne representing her protection of Mary as a child. The blue wavy lines at the center of the shield represent the Detroit River and Ste. Anne Parish's role in the birth of the city of Detroit. Finally the Fluer-de-lis is an acknowledgment of the French heritage surrounding the founding of the church.

Isaiah answered: "This will be the sign for you from the LORD that he will do what he has promised: See, I will make the shadow cast by the sun on the stairway to the terrace of Ahaz go back the ten steps it has advanced."

So the sun came back the ten steps it had advanced.
