

# The Historic Pipe Organs of the Basilica of Ste. Anne de Detroit

## Main Church

The organ in the main church was built by Granville Wood and Sons in 1890 and was rebuilt by Casavant-Freres in 1940 due to water damage sustained during a storm. It is 2 manuals and 26 ranks. Casavant retained all of the Granville Wood pipework and case, while adding some of their own pipework and a new console. This organ is regularly played for liturgies, weddings, funerals, and concerts and is in good repair. It is one of very few Granville Wood organs that still exist in playing condition. A stoplist is below.

## Chapel Organ

The organ in the chapel was built by George Kilgen and Sons in 1903. It was not originally intended for the Basilica of Ste. Anne, but was built for Holy Cross Lutheran Church, formerly located on Joseph Campau St. It was moved to Ste. Anne in 1989. It is one of very few Kilgen organs that has a completely mechanical action. A stoplist is below.
