# VISIT DETROIT'S BASILICA

The Basilica of Ste. Anne de Detroit is the second-oldest continuously operating Catholic parish in the United States.

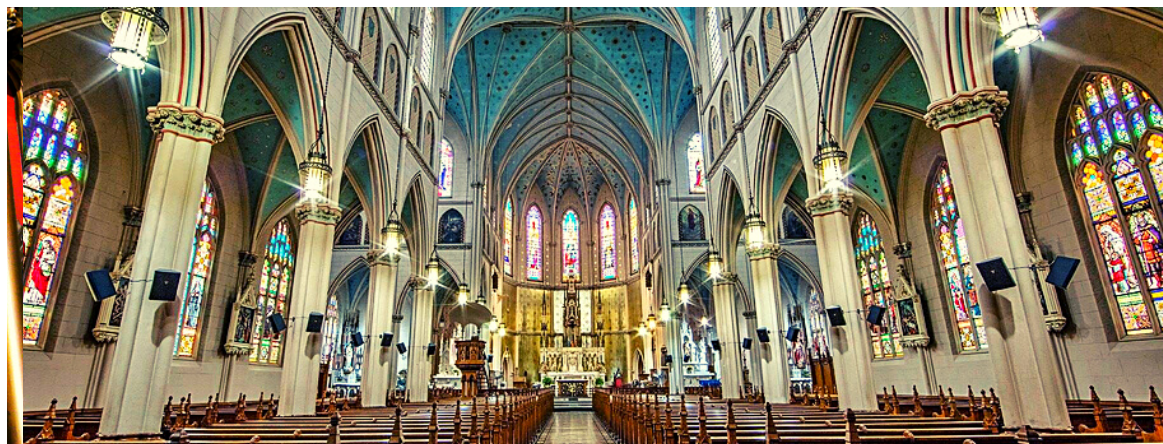
It stands as a place of spiritual, historical, and cultural significance in our city and our nation.

On March 1, 2020 Archbishop of Detroit Allen Vigneron announced that Pope Francis named Ste. Anne Church a minor basilica. The title is given to churches around the world to denote a particular importance in liturgical and pastoral life and a closer relationship with the pope. Ste. Anne is now one of 86 churches in the United States —and only the third church in Michigan —to hold the title of Minor Basilica.

The parish was founded by French explorers in 1701. It has ministered to thousands of people during Detroit's most trying times from the Great Fire of 1805 to the cholera epidemic of 1834, the civil unrest of 1967 and the current coronavirus pandemic. If you want to learn about the history of Detroit, this is the place.

This is also the place to learn about Detroit's most famous pastor, Fr. Gabriel Richard, an extraordinary man whose many achievements include co-founding the University of Michigan and who is now on the path to sainthood.

Visitors can also learn about Catholic history and traditions, neo-Gothic architecture and French, Native American and Latin American culture when they visit the Basilica of Ste. Anne.







# BOOK A TOUR

Our friendly staff is ready to assist you in planning your visit to the Basilica of Ste. Anne de Detroit.

Tours must be scheduled in advance as the basilica is not open during the week to walk-in visitors.

Visitors are welcome any time of the year. In the winter, visitors come for Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, Advent, Las Posadas and Christmas. In the spring visitors can experience Via Crucis and other Holy Week and Easter event. In the summer, we hold our Novena celebration and honor the Feast of Ste. Anne. In the fall we hold our annual exhibit on Fr. Gabriel Richard and our Dia de los Muertos (Day of the Dead) celebrations. And much more!

We have several very knowledgeable docents who will ensure you have an enriching experience. Tours can include Mass if scheduled in advance.

If you are spending the whole day in the city, our team can also recommend dining options and other Catholic and historical sites to visit.
