Division. Conflict. Anger.

Any of those three words could adequately describe the year 2024. But, in reality, can't these words describe our current culture for the past decade?

Without a doubt, many Americans have been sucked into a world of animosity. Our modern world conditions many to believe that anyone who is different from their dearly held identity or opposed to what they stand for must be an inherent enemy. Election seasons ramp up this belief and both news media and social media reinforce this mentality.

Fr. Gabriel Richard also lived in a time of great conflict and division. The War of 1812 ripped apart local communities and divided global powers into warring camps. The Great Fire of 1805 devastated homes and caused suffering among Detroit's residents. Territorial, city and parish politics constantly plagued Fr. Richard's pursuit of peace.

Despite all of this, Fr. Richard was an instrument of healing throughout his life. He attempted to bring peace among Native tribes in Michigan dealing with the impact of alcoholism and land settlement. He brought comfort to residents struggling during the War of 1812 and the 1832 cholera epidemic. Most famously, he provided words of encouragement and hope following the Great Fire.

In this era of identity politics and social media warriors it may be worth looking to Fr. Richard as an exemplar of conduct. And that's because he looked to Jesus as his own exemplar. As a follower of Christ, Fr. Richard became an instrument of healing because Jesus was and still is the ultimate healer. As we conclude the Christmas season, let us thank God for not just sending his healing servant Fr. Richard into the Detroit region but most importantly His Son, who heals all wounds and divisions.

The Words of Fr. Richard

In this letter to the Archbishop of Baltimore, Fr. Richard puts aside religious differences and preaches the Gospel to Protestants in need of a pastor.

Detroit, October 8, 1807

Right Reverend Sir:

This letter is to have you advise me on a point of my present conduct that seems somewhat irregular in some respect. About at the end of August last, I have been invited by our Governor and some other gentlemen to try to preach in the English language. Although I was sensitive to my incapacity, as there is no English minister of any denomination, I thought it could be of some utility to take possession of the ground. In order to prevent any irreverence towards the B. Sacrament, I have found it proper to hold our English meeting not in our chapel, but in our Council-House. As there are many prejudices against our society, particularly among people of lower class or mechanics (N.B. in the whole town there are no more than two English persons of the Roman Catholic society). I found that it would be a great point if I could obtain only that they would be willing to hear me. For that reason, I have chosen for the subject of my Discourses to establish the General Principles of Christian Religion, that is to say the principles used in the discovery of truth, the several causes of our errors, the existence of God, the spirituality, immortality of our soul, Natural Religion and several evidences of the Christian religion in general; I avoided to make any other ceremony but a Discourse or familiar conference, to make an experiment that planning may take more than one year before I should enter into any discriminating point of the Cath. Faith. Every Sunday since the 30th August, I have met about twelve o'clock in the Council House for the above purpose. Last Monday, Mr. Marchaud, the Priest of the British side, advised me to write to you on this subject and to consult you as that matter of preaching seemed to him a little strange and it is to comply with his direction that I now pray you to direct me on this important affair; being ready to comply entirely with your orders.

Richard's meeting with Potawatomi Chieftain Pokagon ultimately resulting in the Potowatomi of southwest Michigan obtaining their own priest.
